



Nepali New Year



Nepal's festival of Bisket Jatra coincides with the solar new year on April 14 and dates back to the Licchavi kingdom, which dominated the Kathmandu Valley from

400–750 AD. This ancient holiday begins with the symbolic slaving of the snakes. An old legend recounts how a cursed princess repeatedly killed her bridegrooms when she inadvertently summoned vicious snakes to their marriage bed. One groom, summoning divine power, killed the snakes, freeing the princess from her curse. The festival culminates with the pulling of two massive chariots, known as raths, which haul two gods, Bhairav and Bhadrakali, god and goddess of creation and destruction. Residents from the city's upper and lower quarters of the city engage in a tug-of-war with the chariots, and the winners bring the raths to their quarter. As in many new years' celebrations, the festivities represent a renewal of life.
